Let's look for a moment at the purpose of this church. Let's consider for a moment why are we a church here, and how are we doing in the midst of a pandemic, these times that are an unprecedented experience for us. First, let's look at the purpose of this church as it is articulated in the official church documents:

"The avowed purpose of this church shall be to worship God, to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ, to celebrate the sacraments of Holy Communion and Baptism, to realize Christian fellowship and unity within this church and the Church Universal, to render loving service toward the whole human family, and to strive for righteousness, justice and peace." (From First Parish United Church of Christ, Somersworth bylaws.)

How do we further the purpose of our church in these times? We worship God still, preaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ, celebrate the sacrament of Holy Communion, and have virtual Christian fellowship every Sunday. Even in a pandemic! Thank you to those who join in and worship with us! Thank you most especially to those who help to produce these worship services, and for everyone's willingness to pivot and adapt to new ways of gathering when we cannot gather physically safely. It has been a challenge! I am so grateful to those who are helping!

All of the vital committees continue to meet during these unprecedented times, using online meeting platforms. Ministry still takes place. The deacons consider worship and prayer and service needs and opportunities. The trustees are observing how collections are down, and of course will need to look at opportunities to fill the gap and fund the ministries of the church. The "Planning for the Future Committee" is tasked with monitoring the COVID situation and considering when and how we can gather safely, and what to do in the meanwhile when we cannot. The Transition Team is trying to develop ways to do the interim work of the congregation while the whole church cannot gather together physically, but most of this work needs to be done in a way that everyone has the opportunity to speak and hear one another together. When council confers it is a time for everything to come together and everyone to hear what everyone's doing.

As you pastor, I am able to visit people now with masks and social distancing, and as you know have been available for porch-visiting and phone visiting throughout the pandemic time. It is not what any of us are used to, but we do the best that we can and know that God is with us. If you have been to a hospital or doctor's office in the past few months, you know that new protocols are everywhere, and the goal is to keep people as safe as possible.

It breaks our hearts that the things that we do when we gather in the sanctuary – meeting close together indoors with the same people for more than a few moments, shaking hands and hugging, singing, speaking congregational responses out loud, gathering for coffee and pastries – all of these activities are why church meetings have been, and are called, *superspreader events*. When we gather, it is not like an encounter with a cashier behind plexiglass at Market Basket that we meet for 2 or 3 minutes. When we gather for worship, we are in the same room, with no air exchange system, doing activities that are known to spread the virus. And we know that we have many, many members whose health is vulnerable. There is a lot of data available, and new data and guidelines coming – from health agencies as well as requirements of the church's insurers – that the Planning for the Future Committee looks at at each meeting in considering how to move forward in the safest way. It is difficult work. Please offer them your thanks and your support.

The last few parts of the mission of this church are these: "to render loving service toward the whole human family, and to strive for righteousness, justice and peace." We do support the food pantry, and there are mission works that continue, or will be continuing, as we move forward. In what other ways might you lead the church in rendering loving service to others in the community? How does this congregation "strive for righteousness, justice and peace?"

Friends, even in the midst of a pandemic, we are still the church. God is still near. And we rejoice, still. God bless you!

Words of Wisdom from Rev. Paul Nickerson, Nickerson Consulting, Congregations Moving Forward

Rev. Paul Nickerson has years of parish ministry and coaching informing his wise and helpful congregational coaching encouragement and guidance. Recently, he had this to say about where we are, five months into this pandemic time:

I have the wonderful opportunity, as a coach, to hear from clergy and lay leaders every week. It really is a delight to have these connections. As the summer moves on, as Covid 19 continues to rage in many parts of the country, and as churches continue to be on line, wondering if they will ever be back in their buildings again, I hear a "weariness" in the voices of many. There is no doubt that all the innovation many church leaders have gone through in the past few months has taken its toll. The initial excitement of technology has worn off, and in fact, 82% of churches are now reporting that on line worship has plateaued or declined, which is just about where we were pre-Covid! Yes, I get it; we would all like something resembling "normal" and it is not there.

If you find yourself "sighing" a lot and feeling a lack of energy and excitement, I would like to offer a few suggestions to get re-invigorated for your ministry:

• Acknowledge that we are transitioning to a new way of doing church. This is the new reality and wasting energy wishing for the "old days" will only lead to further depression.

• Recognize the opportunity: Much of the world has been on line for years and we are catching up with this in the church. People need healing, purpose and meaning for their lives and we can meet them in their digital world and make a difference. Focus on the possibilities.

Friends, we are all ministers in Christ's church. Paul's letter is full of wisdom. I know I am exhausted, and I am sure you are feeling it, too. Please be sure that you get time for rest, and that you take time to open your hearts to the possibilities that are here in this time. Things will be different. How can we create new and better ways of being church, providing healing, purpose, and meaning for those around us?

If you would like to donate to this cause you may drop a life jacket off on Sue Vollkommer's porch, just open the porch door and leave it there. I will bring it inside and take any donations to the fire department. Please have all donations to me by October 1st.

The Mission Committee will be collecting socks for the homeless veteran's home. If you have any socks to donate, you may leave them on Sue Vollkommer's porch. These do not need to be new, but they must be in good condition.

I hope this newsletter finds you healthy and safe. It certainly continues to be a challenging time for us locally and as a nation. I would like to share some candid thoughts with you about our current situation.

Our Planning for the Future committee, a core group from the leadership team, is working hard to figure out what our next steps can safely be during these dangerous times. The group has been putting in the extra effort doing research, discussing options and making the hard decisions because they feel strongly about the safety of our church family.

We are hearing a desire to return to normal from some folks. We are also receiving suggestions on how they would like to do so. Some examples of ideas are a full back to in-building worship or parking lot in-car worship. It is important to recognize that worship won't be normal - looking like it did - until COVID-19 can be brought under control via a vaccine. If we were to go back to in-building worship, we would need to physically distance and wear masks. We also couldn't do some of those things we consider "normal" such as always sitting in the same pew, singing hymns, passing the peace with hugs and coffee fellowship as they have been identified as high-risk activities. In-car worship has its own set of challenges logistically.

I am seeing some people working very hard for our church. In order to plan and implement any variation of a back to inbuilding worship plan we need to work through all of the details. This is necessary to ensure it is understood and can be done safely. We need more people to help with this and figure it out. Candidly speaking, we can't wish something into existence. We need people who are willing to do the hard work. We need your ideas and your involvement.

As your moderator, I have been doing my best to be inclusive of anyone who wants to participate in the discussions. It has included the unproductive debate via email of decisions previously made by committees. This didn't work well and was very frustrating to those who had been at the meeting. I view this as a significant lesson learned.

Ultimately, we as a church, need to decide how we want to approach this. What needs to be done to ensure the safety of <u>all</u> of our church family. If you want to be involved, please reach out to me and I will make sure you are a part of our Planning for the Future meetings.

The speaker will be Masako Wada, who as a young girl in Nagasaki survived the bombing, she is now the Assistant Secretary General of Nihon Hidankyo, the Japanese organization of survivors of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

The event will be hosted by Kevin Martin, President of Peace Action and the ceremony will be led by Reverend Elizabeth Theoharis, co-chair of the Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival.
