Dear Followers of Jesus,

What a time this has been. We're experiencing change we didn't ask for. We've had to adapt in ways we hadn't imagined. So many feelings swirl in our hearts: loneliness, grief, fear, sadness, worry, compassion, love, courage, confidence.... Some of us feel bereft, adrift. And yet. And yet.... We know that our God is always with us, and always loving us into new ways of being church!

Lately I've been taking inspiration from the prophet Nehemiah. When I look at his story, I see a process that may help us.

Feel the feelings Pray Take courage Work to equip ourselves Don't let fear stand in the way of what God is leading us to do

Nehemiah lived in Persia, and was separated from his people. When he heard about the horrible things happening in Jerusalem, he wept. He just sat down and wept. So, that's a first lesson I think Nehemiah can teach us in these days, that it's important to name our losses and grieve them. For some, our grief is the loss of meeting together on Sundays. For others, it is the tremendous loss of life – over 101,000 Americans have died, and over 362,000 people have died worldwide. We grieve and pray with those who've lost loved ones. Some despair over lost jobs, lost income, and all the worries that fall from that. Still others worry over family and friends who live far away, perhaps in regions devastated by the virus. And many of us mourn several or all of these losses. It's important to name our losses, we can bring them to each other and to God, who is the source of our strength and life.

See, after Nehemiah wept, he prayed and fasted for days and days. Only after he had prayed and fasted did he act. Then he went to the king who had conquered Israel intending to ask for permission to go to Jerusalem to rebuild the wall. When he spoke to the king, the king asked Nehemiah why he was there to see him, and before he answered the king, Nehemiah stopped and prayed again, right as he was talking to the king! And the king allowed Nehemiah to go to Jerusalem.

Going to Jerusalem required courage! It was dangerous! When he went back to Jerusalem, it was not the same place as when he'd left. Continually, he prayed. He prayed for resources, he prayed for strength and people to help, he prayed for guidance and courage. He worked to equip himself and build up others for the work at hand. And he overcame fear by recalling that God was with them through hardship, and had always been with them through hardship. Perhaps the most important thing about the Nehemiah story is that Jerusalem wasn't the same after the work was done. Following God's lead, Nehemiah instituted many and great reforms to rededicate the people to God.

So, church, I believe that we are called to these very things in such a time as this! We are called to be aware of our feelings, our losses, our worries, our fears. And we are called to have compassion on one another's feelings in these days. We're called to pray; not so much to tell God what we think but to be open to where God may be leading us. We're called to take courage, and to work to equip ourselves to spread the Gospel and be church in this new reality. And through it all, we rely on one another, support one another, and don't let fear stand in the way of what God is leading us to do!

I miss you and love you all so much! God bless you! Pastor Norma



Not Yet...And I Don't Know When

Nearly twenty years ago, my wife and I entered the adoption process. At our very first orientation with our adoption agency, we were given pin-on buttons that said, "Not Yet and Don't Ask." The idea was that there are so many times through the adoption process when you are asked when your child will arrive that you have the button to provide the answer for you. To be honest, when I first received that button, I thought it rather rude. I came to appreciate it more as our adoption process moved forward. Just a couple weeks after we received a profile with information and a couple of pictures of the young girl we were to adopt, SARS struck in China. Both the United States and Chinese governments said were we not allowed to travel to China to pick her up. I was heartbroken. The delay was excruciating. It was also absolutely necessary.

In my role as Conference Minister, I am asked several times a day the question "When do you think we will be able to resume in-person worship?" I find myself more and more giving an answer similar to that which was on that adoption button, "Not yet...and I don't know when." It seems the most honest answer I can give. It breaks my heart a little every time I need to say it. But I also believe it is necessary.

So I know there is a lot of talk right now about churches "reopening". So you may rightly wonder why I would say "Not yet". Here is my thinking: First, we have had some changes with regard to public health and Covid-19. We now better understand transmission of the virus. There are also some places around the state where we are seeing declines in cases of the disease. But one very important thing that has not changed at all is that churches (and other faith communities) remain a very high-risk location for transmission. The Center for Disease Control has referred to churches as "super spreaders". Because of the numbers we gather in, what we do when we are together and how we do it, churches are incubators for wide-scale communities have begun to resume in person worship (even in modified ways), there has been plenty of anecdotal evidence as well.

Given the high-risk factor of viral spread in church communities, it is clear that when we resume in-person worship our services will need to be highly modified. Unless there are marked changes in testing and tracing or treatment, our services will likely need to remain significantly modified until there is a publicly accessible vaccine. Based on the CDC's Interim Guidelines for Faith Communities and the current conversations occurring in Governor Sununu's Reopening Task Force, such modifications are likely to include limiting the size of worship gatherings, marking seating locations out in tape to promote social distancing, propping doors open throughout the entire gathering (clearly more problematic in the winter), requiring masks be worn by staff and the congregation, abstaining from physical contact, avoiding use of commonly touched items, vigorous cleaning routines and restriction on how and when food may be served. Further, it seems that Governor Sununu will be expecting denominations (in conjunction with their insurance carriers) to provide guidelines regarding liturgical matters such as abstaining from singing and modified routines for serving communion.

As I have written about before, I can't help but wonder if our current alternative forms of worship are providing a more meaningful worship than these highly modified in-person versions will be able to do. As we all know, it is taking a lot of intentional effort to maintain unity of community right now. Some are not able to connect to worship, study and fellowship opportunities the way others are. From my perspective, our churches have been very attentive to this reality. As we return to in-person worship, I believe our unity of community issues will become more complex rather than less. Because of people's personal health risks, we will have some worshipping in person, some likely by technology, and some who are not able to connect in either method. I have no doubt that our congregations will be able to find ways to keep all three groups connected with one another. But it will take time and planning. My concern is that if we resume in-person worship before we've done such planning, we risk leaving some in our communities feeling isolate and deserted.

Finally, I am concerned for the health of our pastors and church musicians. I well know that a significant number of both in our churches fall in to high-risk populations. As a Type-2 diabetic, I do as well. Never before have I known that to limit what I do in ministry, but now, I'll admit, it has me being far more cautious. I was quite touched to hear a story this past week of a Jewish congregation in Concord who told their Rabbi who has a compromised immune system from medical treatments that they would not discuss resuming in-person worship until it was safe for her to do so. We cannot afford to ignore the health risks to our pastors and musicians in our discernment regarding resuming in-person worship. Such conversations need to be had in a respectful and confidential manner, but they do need to happen. We have talked a lot about how our discernment in these days must reflect the love and care for everyone in our communities. Our staff are very much among those who need our love and care right now.

I expect sometime in the next few week's Governor Sununu's Office will provide guidance for the "reopening" of faith communities. After the opportunity to review the Governor's guidance and consult with our insurance carrier, the Conference will provide some denominational guidelines. With those resources in hand, I expect the leadership of our churches will engage in the faithful discernment of what is the best way forward in their setting. Until that time, and perhaps even long after it, when folk inquire of you when in-person worship will resume, I invite you to share my phrase. You could even put it on a button if you want.

Not yet...and I don't know when.

Greetings!

Your leadership team is hard at work keeping an eye on daily operations and well being of the church while planning for the future. Our critical committees continue to meet virtually and carry on the business of the church. Critical committees will continue to meet over the summer instead of taking our usual hiatus.

In addition to the daily operation of the church we have been actively discussing our status as it relates to COVID-19. Per recommendation of the CDC and the State of NH to limit gatherings to 10 or fewer people, we will <u>continue</u> to suspend our in-building worship services and onsite committee meetings <u>through the summer</u>. This will be a constant topic of discussion during our virtual committee meetings. Please know that we take our responsibility to keep our church family safe very seriously.

We have also kicked off a Planning for the Future initiative made up of members of our committees. The purpose of this initiative is to have pro-active conversations focused on several key areas.

- * What is our back to in-building church schedule?: This discussion is focused on the need to be together in-building vs. the safety of our church family. A few of many things we are considering:
- We have a high percentage of at-risk individuals in our church family
- We have to assume that there could always be someone who has been exposed to COVID-19 at our church service.
- Singing requires 30ft of separation and spoken responses are almost the same as singing.
- We would need two pews in between attendees for 6 ft separation. That would result in 2 family members on each end and nobody in the middle.
- We couldn't use the elevator and would need to go in one door and out another.
- Pastor Norma attends regular UCC virtual meetings on COVID-19. She hasn't heard of any UCC churches planning on going back before the fall.
- * What should or will the church look like in the future?: We need to consider how we must change and adapt.
- Would we be able to reach more people with a multi-dimensional/multimedia service?
- We have been reaching new people with our virtual service on Facebook and YouTube. We don't want to lose them!
- We are reaching current church family members who can no longer come to worship in person even before COVID-19.
- What does worship need to look like to ensure we are all safe? Would we need to do COVID 19 testing?
- * What if we can't go back?: What happens if we can't return to the ways of 3 months ago?
- What happens if some of our members don't feel comfortable going back to in-building worship?
- How do we ensure we are ministering to everyone? Those worshiping in-building and at home.

Each committee will be discussing these topics at its meeting and will provide on-going feedback from their members.

I provide you with this information not to cause you undue stress but to show that your church leadership is being proactive and working hard. However, it is also important for everyone to understand the realities of the situation. I couldn't be more impressed by the individuals involved. It is truly a pleasure to work with Pastor Norma, the church officers and committee members. They give me great comfort and faith that we will come out the other side whole and better than before!

There have been positives out of our situation. I have had the pleasure to work more closely with Pastor Norma and have developed a much better understanding of how hard she works for our church. I would like to extend a special thank you to her for the tireless hours she spends serving our church family.

COMMUNITY FOOD PANTRY



Food Pantry Update

The staff of the Community Food Pantry would like to thank the church for allowing us to continue to operate even though no church activities have been occurring due to COVID-19. At the start of the pandemic the pantry experienced an increase in business. Then once clients received extra food stamp funds and stimulus checks, the pantry experienced a decline. This week we have started to pick up again as funds are now starting to run low for clients.

During the first four months of this year the pantry has served a total of 1,113 families consisting of 2,672 individuals. At the start of the crisis, donations from the grocery stores decreased substantially. This happened at the same time as our client numbers started to increase. Through meetings with Good Shepherd Food Bank, agencies had a chance to receive emergency food either in case lots or in prepackaged boxes for curbside distribution. That emergency food helped bridge the grocery store shortage, especially for meat.

We have had to alter our food distribution method because of the virus. All pantry staff are required to wear masks both when picking up from the grocery stores and when working inside the pantry. This is for everyone's protection. When clients arrive at the pantry, they are asked to remain in their vehicles. The cars are lined up in a que like at a drive through window. We have a young volunteer who brings out a two-page grocery list for clients to complete in their cars. This allows for the client to still have choices instead of receiving a box that could contain many items the client might not want or use. Once the list is completed it is collected and filled in the pantry. While the groceries are being pulled and bagged, the client can enter a segregated area of the pantry to select breads and produce. Only one client is allowed in at a time and the area is away from where volunteers are working. The groceries are placed in new bags and put in a sanitized cart. The cart is brought out to the client who unloads the groceries into their vehicle. During the crisis, the pantry will serve any family from any town and as often as the family needs help.

This method has been working well as it still allows clients choice while protecting both them and the pantry staff. It is my hope that in June we may be able to allow clients into the pantry again. However, when this is possible, the cars will still be lined up as they are now. Clients will only be allowed in the pantry when their vehicle is being served. Only when the virus is behind us will clients be allowed into the hall to sit and wait for service. For the time being our activities to raise money for our various missions has been put on hold, but that doesn't mean the generosity First Parish is known for has to stop. There are many ways we can help out in our own communities. Do you have family, friends or neighbors who have a need you are able to help with? Can you give a quick phone call or write a note to someone who cannot get out? You could place a take out order from a local restaurant or shop. The Community Food Pantry is always looking for donations. Our church has many needs that you could help with. Our building may be closed but our church is open and active as we reach out to others with kindness and love.

Aside from the whole-church conversations together, Pastor Norma has asked that everyone share their discernment around a few specific questions by sending their discernings to her in an email or by snail mail. These will help us greatly because these questions she's been prompting you to think about are some of the very questions we have to answer when we put together the church profile! And these are the kinds of questions that prospective candidates will ask the Search Committee. For example, if the Search Committee is in an interview, and the prospective candidate asks, "Where do you perceive this church to be in five years?" what would you say? Or if the prospective candidate asked, "What are the most pressing needs in the community in Somersworth right now, and how is First Church helping to address them?" what would you say?

Both the Transition Team and the Search Committee (when it is formed) will want to be able to respond and share the fullest and most complete picture of our church as possible.

TRUSTEES

Is it summer yet? Sure feels like it! The trustees are still busy even with the lockdown. We are carefully monitoring the finances and physical condition of the church. We meet via the Zoom application and frequently email each other.

Here's our current financial numbers with last year's for comparison:

January's income was even with January, 2019 February's income was \$6,000 lower than February, 2019 March's income was \$10,000 lower than March, 2019 April's income was \$10,000 lower than April, 2019 Our expenses are down this year.

Checking Account Balance: \$49,118.35 (\$2,821.45 unavailable, reserved for various committees)

Mortgage Balance: \$34,205.02

This is somewhat deceptive as the Trustees invested significantly in repairs to the parsonage causing a dramatic increase in expenses in 2019. But we passed a budget with a \$70,000 shortfall, and at this point we're doing far better than that, but still with a significant shortfall.

As church continues while not meeting in the building, the trustees urge you to continue your pledge. You can mail in your pledge every week or once a month. Or you could change your pledge to have it automatically sent to the church each week. If you would like information on how to change your pledge to an automatic payment, please contact your bank or credit union and ask for assistance.

The trustees thank EVERYONE who has sent in their pledges, and those folks who have continued to send in checks for loose collection. We appreciate it.

The trustees have replaced a few lightbulbs here and there, adjusted the siding in a few spots, and we are trying to get multiple estimates for replacing the cracked window in the sanctuary. The lawn is mowed weekly, the hall floor has been scoured, and the building is just waiting for us to return.

We are still looking for volunteers to assist us on the trustees. If you feel called to serve, please contact Rich Whitten, Nancy Brown, or Nancie Cameron.

We look forward to seeing everyone when we return to church, but in the meantime, see you on Sunday on Facebook!
