A colleague shared the following from the writing of Margaret Wheatley, an American writer and management consultant who studies organizational behavior. It is taken from <u>Turning to One Another</u>, 2002:

- ~ Trust that meaningful conversations can change your world. Rely on human goodness. Stay together.



OPEN & AFFIRMING

Greetings from the Open and Affirming Committee.

We continue to work on the planning of several current and future events.

Who is my Neighbor?: These are brief stories that describe a personal moment we have had with a neighbor in our community. As an example, I would like share with you a story about a carpenter who was an immigrant. As a baby, he left his birthplace and hometown with his parents for a better life and to escape persecution. Would you welcome this immigrant into your community? What if you knew they didn't leave Central/South America for the United States but left Bethlehem and Nazareth for Egypt. And, they weren't trying to escape a Latin American dictator, they were escaping a Roman named Herod. Should that really make a difference?

Jesus of Nazareth pointedly teaches His followers to welcome and treat a stranger as they would Jesus Himself, "for I was hungry, and you gave me food, I was thirsty, and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me ...".

Educational events: These events are intended to provide helpful information about various topics related to being an Open and Affirming church. We have established several future dates so that you may plan to join us. The events will be held at 2pm to allow you plenty of time after worship.

February – 11th: Rejection by Church and Community: Why ONA is Important

We had great attendance with several neighbor churches attending as well as members of First Parish. Gerri Cannon shared stories of real life situations about LGBT+ persons who were shunned by their Churches. They have been told that they are abominations and are not welcome to participate in church services, sacraments, and sometimes they are blocked from entering the Church or Church property. To make it even worse, many LGBT people are rejected by their own families. As part of the session we discussed how these people responded to such situations and how we might help.

Please put these up-coming events on your calendar:

- April 8th: Community Round Table with our community churches
- June 10th: *Topic of Interest based on input during the prior two sessions*

Conversations at the High School: Great progress has been made with the planning of this event. Mark and Gerri are collaborating with the High School Counselor Denis Pelletier and have been extremely pleased with the support and enthusiasm they have received. A 6-week framework has been developed and will be presented to Principal Sokul the week of February 19th.

If you have ideas, we would love to hear them. We would also appreciate your involvement, a little or a lot, with our committee.

SOMERSWORTH PREVENTION COALITION

Somersworth Prevention Coalition will host a community coalition meeting on Tuesday, March 20 5:30-6:30PM, followed by a presentation to parents on Drugs, Alcohol, Tobacco and Vaping by Officer Colton Deschenes, hosted by Somersworth Youth Connection, Somersworth Police Department and Somersworth Prevention Coalition. The presentation targets parents of students K-8 but coalition members and friends are welcome. Do you know a parent or family member who might benefit from this presentation—spread the word! Event to be held at Idlehurst Elementary School, Stackpole Road, Somersworth.



In February your Deacons, and others, met and shared a wonderful meal prepared by the outgoing Senior Deacons, Nancy Brown, Linda Palmer, and Sharon Sirois. We then moved into an intentional time of discernment, facilitated by Pastor Mark. He used a devotion based on 1 Corinthians 12:12-26—about life in the Spirit, and that in the body of Christ there are "many parts—one Body—one Spirit." We then shared conversation about our personal faith center. There are many questions that help us get more deeply into that center, our story of faith journey. The reason for doing this was to get a better handle on our individual/First Parish Church-community-purpose/direction.

Bruce Robbins and Pastor Mark each shared their perspective. Others were invited to do so as well. Using the image of the "hula hoop" raised in worship, we were challenged to see ourselves inside the circle. We each have a depth of "feel", how can we bring others to our center? Then, how do we do this outside the circle—i.e. the four walls of our church.

Pastor Mark asked: What are our church's strengths? To you, what is one strength of our church? Each person was then asked to take a post-it, write on it a strength—you could do two—and then come and post it on the easel picture of the church. Responses included: love all around, welcoming-internally/externally, willingness to help, positive environment, generosity, channeling Good News, happy congregation, friendly people, strong faith, giving people-active, leadership, commitments, family-like feel, outreach, people, friendliness, pastor, Bible based, our mission to walk with Jesus Christ, church community/family, generousness of hearts. Mark then asked, "Using this picture, these are inside the circle, these strengths, these named parts of your journey—how do we get these outside the limits of the circle?"

Unpacking these strengths, offered each person the opportunity to speak more deeply. We then asked "What is community to you?" How can we change the dynamic of making a difference in our church process of committees and working groups---how we name a goal and follow it through? The importance of generating ideas, initiating effort to implement, and then "how did it go, engage or let go and look further to implement another idea" to build the Good News message in our world.

One response, "it is the activity oriented parts of what we do as a church that bring meaning to my life, and I know bring our church into the community."

We heard the statement, "We can't do everything—but we can do something" goes back to the purpose of our "doing", that is to express faith in action, which then brings opportunity for building relationship, sharing faith, inviting into community.

From the Deacons

March 4 following worship, we invite our wider church family to be present for a similarly focused time to unpack the concepts named above, so you can step into that deeper, personal look [inside the circle], to then engage and put action behind church work and witness [outside the circle]. Looking inside yourself, from a faith perspective, what ignites, what sparks your presence and participation in God's world? What might be new, "outside the box"? What will inspire a "linking in", what skill/grace can you leverage and share, what makes you more deeply joyful, passionate, hopeful such that you can become an example of the action for God's light and love? It only takes a spark...plan to stay.



HOLY WEEK begins on Palm Sunday and ends of Easter Sunday. **Make a choice to be present in worship with your faith family**. Gather for worship around the events of our Savior Jesus' last week. Share in remembering the events that shape and give meaning to your faith—and what you do in God's name in service to others. In others words, come as you are, but do come!

PALM/PASSION SUNDAY [March 25, 10AM] Today is the gateway to Holy Week. In worship, we will sing of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and share a Blessing of the Palms. During Lent, we've been using the theme of "Signs Along the Way." Common street signs we see [and often ignore] have helped us focus on deepening the message of the 40 days, by inviting us to engage and share with others, our relationship with God. These signs have been placed on the large, wooden cross in the Sanctuary.

The <u>Palm Sunday Gospel</u> for this year, is found in **Mark 11:1-11**. You are encouraged to read the ENTIRE Passion story found in **Mark 14:-1-15:47** to look at and reflect on Jesus' final week that leads to the Cross and Tomb.

PALM SUNDAY ECUMENICAL CANTATA [March 25] "The Story". The cantata will be presented at Holy Trinity Church, 404 High St., Somersworth, NH at 6PM. Some of our own First Parish Church Choir members are participating—plan to be uplifted by this community offering of music! This is coordinated by St. Ignatius of Loyola Parish, Somersworth and St. Mary Parish, Rollinsford.

MAUNDY THURSDAY [March 29]

Simple Soup & Salad Supper [5:30PM, Church Hall]

<u>The Vigil of Maundy Thursday</u>, The Sharing of the Upper Room [7PM, Sanctuary] One of the few times we worship in the evening, will begin with the celebration of the Lord's Supper. This was Jesus' last meal with his disciples. The reading of the Office of Tenebrae follows. This is drawn from the passion narratives in Matthew's Gospel. A moving, solemn time when the gathered church hears the scriptural witness of the shadows of separation from God.

During the Vigil Service, you will see a Deacon wash the feet of another Deacon. In John 13 (the only Gospel to record this), Jesus washed the feet of the disciples while they were gathered to share the Passover meal. Tonight, we include this symbolic action in our Vigil Service as a sign of the humility of Jesus to those he loved. At the conclusion of tonight's service, we are asked to leave in silence.

For those who choose, *you may remain following the service to participate in footwashing* by a team of our Deacons. There will be two foot washing stations in the front of the sanctuary, one for men, one for women. This will be done as quietly as possible. Foot washing can include a reflective moments before and after, as you ponder what it is that Jesus does for you, and then calls you to do for friend, neighbor, visitor, stranger.

GOOD FRIDAY WITNESS [March 30] *Prayers and Waves 12 NOON and 3PM*, in and around Somersworth and Berwick. This will be more fully explained in the Palm Sunday bulletin. We will join with Berwick United Methodist Church for a *Good Friday Service* at **5:30PM** in the Chapel at Evergreen Cemetery, Cemetery Road, Berwick, ME.
